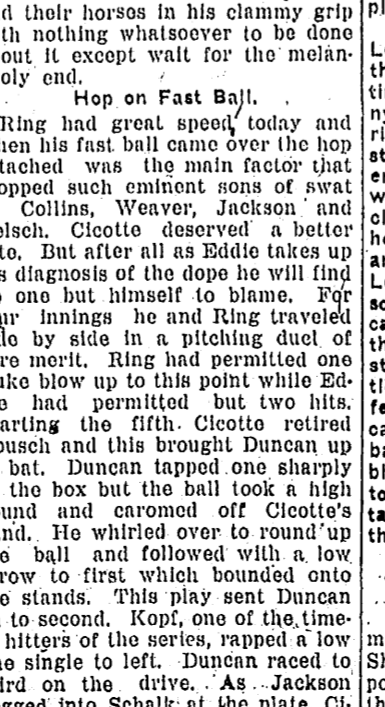

WORLD'S SERIES GATE OVER THREE MILLION

Attendance at Games Played So Far Nearly Two Million Persons.

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 4.—What the world series means in dollars and cents to the baseball fraternity was exemplified by the statements that before the present series is completed the gate receipts for such contests played under the jurisdiction of the national commission will reach the impressive total of more than \$3,500,000.

The Sox blow chances. The Sox had their chances but they all went to naught. Starting the second inning Joe Jackson lifted a high winging fly to center which Roush badly misplayed. The Red star first ran back on the ball and then came in to hit to haul it down. This was a starter. During the past fourteen seasons the attendance totaled 1,915,494 and as seventy-eight games were played there has been an average attendance of 22,600 persons per game. In the same period these spectators have paid in at the gate about \$1,800 for the privilege of watching the play, the aggregate gate receipts for the seventy-eight games being \$3,429,720 in round figures, which is an average of very close to \$44,000 per game.

Cicotte blows own game. Cicotte and Ring fought out a brilliant duel in the fourth canto of the big championship, but where Ring was the victor in this contest, Cicotte was the victor in the fifth inning by breaking up in his defensive play. Strangely enough the ancient wind held up and it was the ancient bean that went awry. Can you happen to recall the details it was Cicotte's slow fielding and bad throw which cost him five runs and complete annihilation in his first start.

AMATEURS SURPRISED AT ROURKE'S ACTION

Last month when the amateurs sought to get Rourke park for the game between the Murphys and Gordon-Burgess of St. Paul Rourke refused to allow the game to be played. NEBRASKA NO MATCH FOR HAWKEYE ELEVEN

Schulte's Men Fail Miserably in First Conflict of the Season.

Special Dispatch to the World-Herald. Iowa City, Ia., Oct. 4.—Iowa defeated Nebraska, 18 to 0, this afternoon. The Hawkeyes achieved their second victory in two years and incidentally their second since twenty years ago with unexpected ease. They fairly ran away from the Cornhuskers in the first quarter, which ended thirteen to nothing, but played a defensive game much of the latter part of the contest with many substitutes in line.

During the last few moments of play Nebraska shot a pass from the ten-yard line and the receiving end muffed the ball, which rolled behind the goal. Belding clambered on Dobson's prostrate frame and Iowa garnered her final two points. This was the first safety scored on the Iowa field in years.
