Nebraska's first glimpse of the Cornhusker brand of football proved an eye-opener for the tremendous audience, and an eye-shutter for Rutgers, the New Jersey aggregation being ablated to the extent of 28 to 0, with scarcely a chance to score.

The game was watched by most of the big crowd of the effort. It was the fame of Nebraska's brand of football that drew the spectators to the polo field, where Walter Camp admitted that the average player should not be so proficient as they are abroad.

Nebraska astonished the New York spectators by the steadiness of its attack. While having little of the marline brilliancy that lighter teams display, it set solidly to its work from the squad of the first whistle.

Just before the game was drawn to a conclusion, Nebraska topped an other one little trick, but it was on a fluke. Swanson luckily caught a forward pass from Captain Dale, which had bounded from the hands of two intercepting Rutgers players, but which was taken before touching the ground.

Golf. How to Play It.

Match Play or Practice?

A friend of mine was talking the other day about the quality of golf played here and in Great Britain. He made an observation which is interesting and certainly not without a basis in truth. It was that the general standard of excellence of golf is higher in Great Britain than it is here because in this country golf is an endless series of matches including club tournaments, state tournaments, sectional tournaments, championship matches, etc., while abroad there are comparatively few such contests and the individual player, therefore, naturally gives a great deal of attention to experimentation and the study of golf.

There is another disadvantage in too much match play and that is the thrill of the contests which brings out the best golf in many players is lost by too many contests. In view of these facts I am inclined to think that a player who feels within himself the possibilities of first class golf will do well not to neglect practice in order to be continually participating in tournaments.

The age at which a man plays his best golf is a much discussed question. But as we look over the records of this country it seems that most of our champions reach the top of their form somewhere between 22 and 32. In Great Britain, according to the records, the youngest man to win a championship was J. H. Taylor, when he was the open title at 23. Vardon took his first championship at 26. With these exceptions the British champions had been well along in the 30's before reaching the top.

Q.—How many bills were presented to the last congress?—I. M. C. A.—The sixty-sixth congress has had 1,480 bills and joint resolutions presented to it. The total of bills actually passed by both houses was 503.

Q.—Is chop suey a native Chinese dish?—H. B. A.—This dish, popular in Chinese restaurants in America, was apparently formed by English speaking Chinese restaurant keepers in this country. English "chow" plus Chinese "suey" meaning bits of fragments chopped into small pieces and cooked.

Q.—How many songs can a mocking bird sing?—D. B. B. A.—The ordinary song notes of the mocking bird are varied. They sing during the night, as do nightingales, and appear to begin their song with the rising of the moon. Their imitative notes are, however, even more varied than their natural tones. They imitate successfully many other birds and when kept in confinement all sounds of the household, as well as the meowing of cats, barking of dogs, etc., are within their repertoire.

A.—Pennies are legal tender only up to 25 cents. This is also true of 5-cent pieces, subsidiary silver coins, such as 10-cent pieces, quarter-dollars and half-dollars are legal tender for amounts not exceeding \$10 in any one payment.

Q.—Did Sir Walter Raleigh ever come to this country?—J. B. W. A.—Sir Walter Raleigh never actually visited America. He was fitted out on the expedition which planted the settlement on Roanoke island on the Carolina coast. He was in company with the expedition, but the queen refused to allow him to leave England.

Q.—What were the dates of the deaths of Miles Standish, John Alden and Priscilla Alden?—W. L. S. A.—Miles Standish died on October 3, 1682; John Alden, September 12, 1687; Priscilla Alden died on October 3, 1687. No record of the death of Priscilla Alden although it is known that she died before her husband.

Q.—What does the word "avuncular" mean?—A. M. P. A.—"Avuncular" is derived from "avunculus" a Latin word meaning uncle. Its primary meaning is "of or pertaining to an uncle." In a humorous way, a paw-fucker is some one spoken of as an avuncular relative.
